If no candidate receives more than 50 percent of the total votes cast in the March 6, 2018 election, the candidates with the highest and second-highest vote totals from the election will be subject to a runoff election. The runoff election would be held between 35 days to 45 days after the canvass of the

March 6, 2018 election is completed. The specific runoff election date would be set by vote of the Rio Rancho Governing Body.
