## President's Report by Starlyn Brown

### The Price of Freedom: Reflections on America's 250th Birthday

On July 4, 2026, our nation celebrates a remarkable milestone—the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. On that day in 1776, thirteen colonies boldly declared themselves the **United States of America**, transforming colonies into states.

Most Americans are familiar with these inspiring words:

*"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."*

But it is the final sentence that truly reveals the gravity of their choice:

*"And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."*

The signers understood a profound truth: **freedom is not free**. They knew there would be steep costs—lives lost, families forever changed, fortunes sacrificed, and reputations put at risk. Yet they signed their names anyway.

### Timeless Grievances, Modern Echoes

While we often focus on the inspiring philosophy of the preamble, the core of the document actually consists of **27 specific grievances** against King George III. I'll admit that until recently, I hadn't closely examined these. I highly encourage everyone to visit the [National Archives Declaration of Independence Transcription](#) to read them in full.

What I found when reading through them was deeply striking—and frankly, disturbing. Though written in the language of 1776, many of these grievances carry a meaning that feels incredibly relevant and resonates in our current political climate.

Consider how closely these historical warnings echo modern concerns about the overreach of power and the erosion of civic institutions:

- Obstruction of justice and interference with the judiciary;
- Judges being dependent upon the will of those in power;
- The creation of excessive government offices and burdens on the people;
- Military power operating without proper civilian oversight;
- Taxation without consent;
- Deprivation of the right to trial by jury; and
- Fundamental changes to government without the consent of the governed.

## **A Call to Action: It's Time to Be Bold**

The Revolutionary War was a grueling, painful struggle. Our forefathers did not declare independence lightly. They calculated the immense cost, braced themselves, and chose to be bold anyway. They chose courage.

As we celebrate America's 250th birthday, their example offers us an important reminder. Democracy is not self-sustaining. Constitutional principles cannot defend themselves. Voting rights must be protected by engaged and informed citizens.

It is once again time to be bold.

The League of Women Voters of Central New Mexico has always stood for democracy, constitutional principles, and the rights of voters. As a grassroots organization, our strength comes from ordinary people who are willing to raise their voices and take action.

On this historic anniversary, let us honor those who pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor by recommitting ourselves to the work of self-government.

**Freedom is not free. Democracy requires participation. And our voices still matter.**

We must be unyielding in defending democracy, protecting the Constitution, and empowering voters. We are a grassroots organization, which means our true strength comes from the ground up. We have a powerful voice—and this election year, it's time to get louder!

## **JULY EDUCATIONAL MEETING**

**TOPIC:** Access to Healthcare in New Mexico

**SPEAKER:** Dr. Joanne Turnbull, PhD, Chair, Healthcare Committee, League of Women Voter of Southern New Mexico, and Steering Committee for Patients Primero

New Mexico's shortage of health care providers is a full-blown crisis. Lack of physicians and other healthcare providers result in untreated conditions and communities without adequate resources. The situation is especially dire in rural areas where hospitals and clinics are threatened with closure.

This LWVCNM Educational presentation describes the crisis, the key factors that are driving it, statewide advocacy efforts that led to the passage of House Bill 99 (Medical Malpractice Changes) in January 2026, and the League's new statewide study, The Impact of Medical Malpractice on Access to Care. Although HB99 limited punitive damages, healthcare providers indicate that this addresses only a fraction of the challenges facing NM physicians.

During the April 2026 LWVNM Council, the LWVSNM Healthcare Access Study was adopted as a statewide study, and study chair Joanne Turnbull is actively recruiting committee members from the three other local leagues. LWVCNM invited JoAnne to offer a discussion of the challenges facing New Mexicans seeking healthcare and obstacles to healthcare providers in New Mexico.

Joanne Turnbull earned a PhD in Social Work & Psychology from the University of Michigan and an MFA from the University of Southern Maine in Creative Writing. She has practiced as a psychotherapist and taught marital and family therapy and advanced clinical practice in the Department of Psychiatry at Duke, the University of North Carolina, Columbia University and the University of Michigan Schools of Social Work. She also held senior administrative positions at Duke, the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, and the University of Texas Medical Center, and is Executive Director Emerita of the National Patient Safety Foundation. In addition to numerous academic articles, she has published fiction and an award-winning essay. She was awarded a Healthier Communities Fellowship by the American Hospital Association and co-authored To Do No Harm: Ensuring a Culture of Safety in Health Care. She chairs the Healthcare Committee for the League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico and serves on the Steering Committee for Patients Primero.

Please join LWVNM members for this hybrid meeting on Thursday, July 9<sup>th</sup> at 12:00 MDT and offer your perspective regarding potential solutions to this ongoing healthcare crisis in New Mexico.

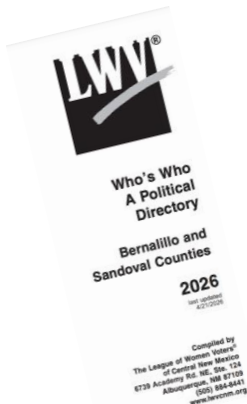
We received \$5,000.00 from the League of Women Voters of New Mexico Education Fund to support printing costs for the primary election. Fundraising efforts for the Voter Guide are ongoing in anticipation of greater expenses for the November general election.

In addition to the print versions of the guides, our website statistics showed that the Bernalillo/Sandoval *Voter Guide* .pdf version was viewed 14,244 times, and the Torrance/Valencia .pdf version was viewed 564 times. We have not yet received a report about VOTE411 utilization for our primary.

At the time of this report, we do not have all the specific information about the independent (declined to state) voter participation, but statewide estimates at the time of this report indicate that 37,600 unaffiliated voters cast ballots. The majority selected to participate in the Democratic primary.

Voter turnout in the LWVCNM counties was similar to that noted for the state.

# **OBSERVER REPORTS**



## **Observer Corps Report – Albuquerque City Council meeting**

**May 18 /June 1, 2026**

All Councilors attended the May 18 and June 01 2026 meetings: Stephanie Telles – District 1, Joaquin Baca – District 2, Klarissa Peña – District 3, Brook Bassan – District 4, Dan Lewis – District 5, Nichole Rogers – District 6, Tammy Fiebelkorn – District 7, Dan Champine – District 8, Renée Grout – District 9

General Information: Members of the public were allowed one minute at the June 01 meeting. During that meeting there were 30 speakers during the General Public Comment period and 50 speakers during consideration of OC-33-26 to increase the minimum wage rate. Despite the limits on speaking time, the meeting did not adjourn until after 1 a.m.

### **Increase of the Minimum Wage OC-26-33**

At the June 01 meeting, the City Council considered a bill to increase Albuquerque's minimum wage. At least 80 members of the public spoke on this bill, 30 during General Public Comment and 50 during the specific bill comment period. Thirty-eight spoke in favor of the bill and twenty-nine spoke against. Some people spoke in opposition to specific provisions of the bill, such as raising the wage 25% the first year, rather than phasing it in and tying future cost of living adjustments to escalation factors such as Consumer Price Index and Fair Market Rent as published by US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

During public comment Council President Peña asked two individuals to be escorted from the meeting:

- After a speaker commented that the minimum wage increase was an example of "suicidal empathy" and called for a study of the effects of a minimum wage increase, someone from the audience (who had previously spoken) made audible comments. Council President Peña hammered the gavel, but when the comments continued, she gaveled again and stated that ridiculing behavior would not be tolerated. She asked that the audience member be removed from chambers and called for a five-minute recess. It appeared that the person left voluntarily, though the camera angle did not provide a view of the actual departure.

- A speaker who looked in the camera and directly addressed the video audience and who later directly addressed Councilor Lewis about an email he sent in 2023 to the Apartment Association of New Mexico was escorted from the chambers. Council President warned the speaker several times that comments could only be addressed to her. The speaker persisted and after the third warning was surrounded at the podium by five police officers. Council President Peña called for a recess and the video cut away.

In the end, the Council voted to pass an amended bill which phased in an increase of the minimum wage to \$15 per hour in one dollar increments over three years. The final version dropped the use of HUD's Fair Market Rent as a factor in future adjustments.

Councilors voting in favor: Baca, Fiebelkorn, Peña, Rogers, and Telles.

Councilors voting against: Bassan, Champine, Grout, and Lewis.

The bill was sent to Mayor Keller for signature on June 08.

### Rental Unit Habitability Enforcement Ordinance O-26-24

At the June 01 meeting, the Council passed an ordinance that defines enforcement tiers for “Habitability Violations” that are not addressed. With three violations in a twelve-month period, the responsible party is fined \$500 for the third violation and each violation thereafter. The bill requires the responsible party to pay relocation costs for residents while any remediation occurs.

Councilors voting in favor: Baca, Champine, Fiebelkorn, Peña, Rogers, and Telles.

Councilor’s voting against: Bassan, Grout, and Lewis.

The bill was sent to Mayor Keller for signature on June 08.

### Ballot Measure for Fall Election – Public Safety Gross Receipts Allocation R-26-29

The Council unanimously passed a resolution to put a proposition before the voters in the fall election. The proposition calls for changing the allocation of the Public Safety Gross Receipts Tax (GRT).

Voters will decide whether to change the Public Safety GRT allocation from its current distribution: 34% Police Department, 34% Fire/Emergency Prep, 6% Corrections, 26% Crime Prevention.

The proposed distribution would be: 35% Police, 6% Prisoner Transport, 38% Fire, 5% Code Enforcement, 8% Albuquerque Community Safety, 8% Health, Housing and Homelessness. These changes would not increase the tax rate.

### Bernalillo County Commission Passes Ordinance Outlining Goals for Economic Development Incentives

Four of the five county commissioners were present for the June 9 meeting: Barbara Baca, Frank Baca, Adriann Barboa, and Walt Benson. Commissioners Eric Olivas was excused.

A new ordinance outlining specific goals that must be met in order to provide tax incentives to companies wishing to locate within Bernalillo County has been passed by the County Commission. Companies seeking Industrial Revenue Bonds, Local Economic Development Act funding or other county incentives will be evaluated to determine the level of incentive offered.

Companies seeking incentives must:

- ☐ Increase or preserve the tax base
- ☐ Provide employment opportunities in the county
- ☐ Provide, construct, or help acquire public facilities
- ☐ Develop or remove blighted areas
- ☐ Provide access to affordable housing or services for county residents, and
- ☐ Finance or provide public infrastructure

The new ordinance is an effort to provide some consistency when evaluating economic development incentives companies might qualify for.

During public comment the commission also heard from unhappy Metropolitan Detention Center correctional officers who have taken a “no confidence” vote in the Warden of the facility. Officers said the Warden, and supervising officers he has brought in from other states, do not listen to the concerns of officers represented by the local union and that they have imposed policies that create unsafe situations for both inmates and corrections officers.

There was some testimony from mothers of inmates and former inmates that the new operating rules have created a better environment for inmates. County Manager Cindy Chavez told the commission she backs the current Warden and believes he is operating in the best interests of everyone at the facility. Commissioners did not discuss the issue at the meeting.



## **Sandoval County Commission regular meeting**

### **Description of Issues Relevant to the League**

#### **Economic Development**

The Albuquerque Regional Economic Alliance (AREA) reported the following new initiatives:

- ☐ a partnership with Albuquerque Journal that would distribute AREA data to business leaders to understand regional economic trends and impacts
- ☐ a regional workforce summit (7/23/26) to create a strategy to meet regional manufacturing technician demands in collaboration with Workforce Connection of Central New Mexico, Workforce Solutions, CNM and others.

As background, the LWVNM believes that the state’s leadership role in planning, implementing, and funding economic development should include:

- ☐ supporting/assisting state regions in developing their own unique plans;
- ☐ developing an excellent educational system;
- ☐ expanding the use within the state of the capabilities of the universities and the labs; and
- ☐ providing centralized expertise for specialized areas such as technology commercialization, international trade, intellectual property, and regulatory approvals.

#### **Additional Comments**

##### **Sandoval County Elected Officials Salary Commission**

Approved publication of a draft ordinance that would create an independent Sandoval County Elected Officials Salary Commission. A five-member commission, each appointed by a County Commissioner as a representative at least 90 days before a county general election, would finalize salaries for elected officials before election day.

##### **Sandoval County Land Bank**

Sandoval County has accepted donations of land in the unincorporated Rio Rancho Estates from owners who have never improved the lots. Many live out of state; some are now deceased. The County seeks to sell these parcels to return the land to the tax rolls. Resurrection Land Company, an AMREP subsidiary, is buying 29 non-contiguous, undeveloped lots in Rio Rancho Estates from the County for economic development or trade.



## **Sandoval County Commission regular meeting**

**June 10, 2026**

No topics for which the League has an advocacy position were taken up during this meeting.

### **Additional Comments**

#### Public Comments

Three out of three commentators spoke in favor of passing a subsequent resolution calling for the resignation of the County Assessor, including the County Assessor.

#### Amending the Sandoval County Ethics Code

The County Attorney proposed an amendment to the Sandoval County Ethics Ordinance to recognize the existence of the State Ethics Commission for reviewing complaints over which the Sandoval County Ethics Board lacks authority. It clarifies that County employees are subject to the Personnel department, rather than a public process in front of the County Commission. It also moves staff support for the County Ethics Board from the County Attorney's office to the County Manager's office to avoid conflict of interest in which the County Attorney is asked to represent the employee, the Board, and to oversee action against the employee. The Commission voted to postpone consideration of this amendment and to move to the resolution described below.

#### Resignation of the County Assessor

The Commission voted 4-1 to pass a resolution calling on County Assessor Linda P. Gallegos to resign. NMSA 1978 § 10-6-3 states that an elected official who accepts additional paid employment and "shall fail for a period of thirty successive days or more to devote his time to the usual and normal extent during ordinary working hours to the performance of the duties of such public office and employment, shall be deemed to have resigned from and to have permanently abandoned his public office and employment."

The Assessor had been appointed Cash Manager by the State Treasurer and, rather than resigning at the time, continued to work as Assessor through the election while the other 3 assessors were required to be out of the office. Note that resolutions are non-binding, elected County Commissioners do not have authority over other elected officials, and the County has not defined "usual" work hours for elected officials. Two Commissioners argued that the matter should not be decided based on what is legal, but according to each Commissioner's sense of what is moral.

**Middle Rio Grande Housing Collaborative (MRGHC) -  
Affordable Housing Report  
June 2026

The MRGHC met on Thursday, May 28, 2026 at the MRCOG Offices Board Room for a regularly scheduled meeting. Four of the five current MRGHC Commissioners attended: Lawrence Rael, Chair, Ian Robertson, Steve Anaya and Connie Chavez.

Other attendees were: Tommy Cummins and Marcos Gonzales, County staff; Lisa Huval, Office of Housing, NM Department of Workforce Solutions (DWS); Mike Loftin, Homewise; and Kenneth Rudhardt, Executive Director of Isleta Pueblo Housing.

The meeting was called to order by Lawrence Rael, Chair. The Agenda was approved, and no public comment was offered.

Lisa Huval, Office of Housing, DWS provided an update on the housing programs, housing developments and expenditures for the FY25-26 funding (\$154,397,249) that were allocated to DWS via HB2, HB2-GRO and Capital Outlay funds. Huval stated that the Office of Housing secured 3 years of operational funding for the department that will provide stable funding moving forward. She stated that the Office had released an RFI in May for Housing projects in partnership with governmental entities for affordable housing, permanent supportive housing, and transitional housing; and a 2<sup>nd</sup> RFI for Cooling Centers and Street Outreach.

She stated that 50% or \$58,130,517 of the FY25-26 funds (referenced above) are allocated to Bernalillo County and the City of Albuquerque. Bernalillo County will build a total of 11 affordable housing projects containing 945 housing units; 76 supportive housing units at Bernalillo County's Ponderosa Place project; and \$5,460,955 for a Young Adult Housing and Treatment Navigation Center and services. The remainder (\$16.2M) has been allocated to the City of Albuquerque for the Gateway Emergency Shelter and services; and Home Repair and Homeless Prevention Services.

Mike Loftin, Executive Director of Homewise, provided a presentation to the MRGHC titled "Housing as Economic Infrastructure: A Public-Private Strategy for Housing in Albuquerque." Loftin stated there is a real need in the community for smaller, entry-level homes that allow homeowners to afford their own home and build wealth. In this way homeowners will have a fixed housing cost over time vs. rental payments that increase over time as they are tied to the housing market. He discussed the importance of a strong Housing Mobility Ladder that offers a pathway from Homeless Transitional Housing to subsidized rental & market-rate rentals to starter homes. Loftin said Homewise offers the following support services to homebuyers:

- downpayment assistance,
- homeownership counseling and education, and
- money management skills and budgeting

Kenneth Rudhardt, Executive Director of Isleta Pueblo Housing, provided a brief presentation on the housing shortage for urban Native Americans seeking housing in New Mexico cities, particularly Albuquerque. His organization wants to collaborate with other housing finance organizations to address this urgent situation.

After these informational presentations, the MRGHC adjourned to closed session to interview the final candidates for the position of MRGHC Executive Director. Returning from closed session, an announcement was made that Marcos Gonzales from Bernalillo County staff was selected and offered the MRGHC Executive Director position.

LWVNM Housing Position: The League of Women Voters of New Mexico supports current and future efforts to increase the availability of safe, decent affordable housing for moderate- and low-income households.

The next regular meeting of the MRGHC will be June 25, 2026 at 1:30 pm at the MRCOG Board Room and virtually via Zoom.
